They learned the basic ideas and techniques used for audit with a focus on Flag State requirements and discussed the implementation of the ISM Code in EU Member States in the Black Sea region.

#### Introduction

Following the capsize of the HERALD OF FREE ENTERPRISE in 1987 the IMO introduced the ISM code as a Quality Management System for ships and ship management companies in order to address human element aspects in ship safety. The sinking of the ESTONIA in 1994 was followed by a European initiative introducing the ISM code as mandatory instrument on passenger ferries at an accelerated schedule compared to the original IMO schedule.

Since then the ISM Code has become an increasing important instrument to manage maintenance and safety topics on board ships.

The main objectives of the seminar were to understand

- The requirements of the ISM Code, its interpretation and application;
- The process of auditing and certification within the scope of the ISM Code, on-board as well as in the company;
- The basic audit technique in conducting ISM and management system audits;
- The mandatory rules and regulations and applicable codes, principal guidelines and standards recommended by the IMO, administrations, classification societies and maritime industry organisations and the
- Exchange of experience between the participants.

The seminar aimed at persons involved in the ISM audit and certification process at maritime administrations of the partner countries of the TRACECA Maritime Safety and Security II Project, a list of participants is attached as Annex 1. Besides the aspects on auditing the ISM Code, the agenda of the seminar addressed also topics related to the EU approach and the influence of the ISM implementation of the quality of a flag States fleet, the agenda is attached as Annex 2 to this document.

## Speaker

The seminar was moderated by key expert Stephan Assheuer acting also as speaker on the third day. The main speaker at the seminar was Mr Jörg Schwinning, an expert working in the ISM field since the early beginnings of the system with more than 20 years experience as ISM lecturer and trainer.

As additional speakers the following experts from Bulgaria and Romania presented at the seminar their experience of implementing the ISM regime with a particular focus on EU aquis:

- Capt. Alexander Iliev, Chief Inspector of the Bulgarian Maritime Administration in Burgas
- Mr. Constantin Raicu, Head of ISM ISPS Department of the Romanian Naval Authority







### **Programme**

#### Day 1 and Day 2, 10/11 November 2014

On behalf of the project Stephan Assheuer welcomed the participants and introduced the agenda and programme of the seminar. The first two days were assigned to the International Safety Management Code, it's history, it's regulations and aspects of auditing an ISM system.

Mr Schwinning briefly introduced the background and history of the ISM regime and explained the fundamentals of a Quality Management System and ISM. He then went section by section through the regulations, for each section practical examples were presented and discussed. On selected topics small groups were tasked to discuss the topics and develop respective positions. The results of these group work sessions are shown in annex 3. Finally the links, synergies and differences between the ISM regime and other management approaches were discussed before concluding the very detailed excurse through ISM by some aspects related to work of Administrations. The presentation delivered by Mr. Schwinning is attached as Annexes 4.

#### **Day 3, 12 November 2014**

The third day of the seminar focused on aspects implementation of ISM by an Administration and implications on the work of an Administration. The day started with a presentation by Mr. Assheuer on Obligations of Administrations related to ISM, looking at obligation emanating from the different IMO instruments (annex 5). In a second presentation Mr. Assheuer then discussed the implications of ISM on the quality of a state's fleet (annex 6) emphasising the role and responsibility of the company for the quality of the fleet and that the ISM regime provides the means directly to address this role. As introduction into the presentation of experience made by the European Black Sea coastal States Bulgaria and Romania, Mr. Assheuer highlighted the EU aquis related to ISM (annex 7) before Capt. Alexander Iliev from the Bulgarian Maritime Administration in Burgas and Mr. Constantin Raicu from the Romanian Naval Authority shared their experience in implementing ISM under EU aquis with the participants (annexes 8 and 9).

The last topic of the day and the seminar discussed the various options and levels of delegation of authority to recognized organisations (RO) and the consequences. In his presentation Mr. Assheuer highlighted in particular the problem of communication in case ISM services and other statutory survey and certification services are provided by different ROs (annex 10). The presentations are attached as Annex 5 to 10.







# **Summary**

The seminar introduced the ISM Code, the system and the specific requirements as well the aspects related to audits to a level of knowledge needed for an internal auditor. Options and obligations of maritime administrations related to SOLAS Chapter IX and the ISM Code were discussed including aspects related to the delegation of authority. The participants could share experience with representatives from the EU Member States Bulgaria and Romania.











How would you assess the risk (see also slide 39 Annex4)?



















