National procedure for EU legislation (1)

Decree No.85 of the Council of Ministers for coordination of matters related to the European Union

National procedure for EU legislation (2)

New EU legislation ⇒ preparation of a draft of a legal act ⇒ co-ordination within the different ministries ⇒ approval of the act ⇒ transposition into the national legislation ⇒ notification to the Commission

EU monitor and control of implementation and application of the relevant legislation

⇒ Obligation to report to the Commission

⇒ Audit by the Commission/the European Maritime Safety Agency audit



National procedure for EU legislation (3)

Overview of the main BMA activities for EU accession (1)

2000 – 2006 BMA participated in the negotiations for accession of the Republic of Bulgaria to the EU Chapter 9 Transport policy of the EU acquis (maritime safety part)

Tasks fulfilled:

- ⇒ Alignment of the national legislation
- ⇒ Revision of national legislation
- ⇒ Drafting and adoption of relevant national legislation
- ⇒ Quality Management System in place for proper implementation and application of legislation



Overview of the main BMA activities for EU accession (2)

⇒ Twinning project BG 01 TR01 Marine Safety Institution Building - between the Republic of Bulgaria and the Netherlands

Duration – 2 years

Budget – 800 000 Euro

Gap analysis of the Bulgarian national legislation on maritime safety and the EU acquis;

Result – fully harmonized national legislation and more than 20 ordinances drafted and adopted

⇒ Twinning project BG 03/IB-TR-02 Strengthening the administrative capacity of BMA by introduction of European standards with respect to the safety of navigation by sea and river

Duration - February 2005 to June 2006 Budget - 697 000 Euro Introduction of computerized Quality Management System (QMS) based on the ISO 9001:2000 standard Result - Review of BMA structure

 Reorganization of BMA expectation system
- ⇒ PSO Project 2006 04/BG/8/18 Implementation of maritime safety legislation by BMA

- ⇒ Trainings of BMA staff within the projects

- ⇒ ISO certified Quality Management System in place for proper implementation and application of legislation
- ⇒ Review of BMA structure
- ⇒ Trained BMA experts and inspectors

Participation in EU decision making process Participation in EU legislative process

New EU legislation \Rightarrow preparation of a draft of a legal act \Rightarrow transposition into the national legislation \Rightarrow notification to the Commission \Rightarrow in case of non-conformities - infringement procedure/ penalties



Conclusion (2)

The international character of the international commercial shipping requires international approach in development and implementation of regulatory and legislative measures ⇒

The legislative measures developed at EU level on the basis of already accepted international measures:

- ⇒ Facilitate the entry into force of the relevant international treaty and
- ⇒Facilitate the implementation and application of the relevant regulations at regional and at national level and
- ⇒Sometimes impose more stringent requirements and criteria

The implementation and application of these measures are subject to monitor and control.
